Chapter 1: Introduction and Background

1.1 Introduction

The Official Languages Act 2003 provides for the preparation by public bodies of a language scheme detailing the services which they will provide:

- through the medium of Irish,
- through the medium of English, and
- through the medium of Irish and English

and the measures to be adopted to ensure that any service not currently provided by the body through the medium of the Irish language will be so provided within an agreed timeframe.

In accordance with section 14(3) of the Act, language schemes remain in force for a period of 3 years or until such time as a new scheme is confirmed by the Minister for Arts, Heritage and the Gaeltacht, whichever is the later.

1.2 Preparation and Content of the Scheme

In the preparation of this scheme, due regard has been given to the Guidelines issued by the Department of Arts, Heritage & the Gaeltacht. In addition, there has been a comprehensive process of consultation with relevant stakeholders.

The **Louth and Meath Education and Training Board (LMETB)** is guided by the principle that the provision of Irish language services should be based on:

- the underlying level of demand for specific services in the Irish language
- the importance of a proactive approach to the provision of such services
- the resources, including human and financial resources, and the capacity of the body concerned to develop or access the necessary language capability

This scheme complements the principles of Quality Customer Service and our Customer Charter. This scheme has been formulated with the intention of ensuring that all relevant obligations under the Official Languages Act by **LMETB** will be fully addressed on an incremental basis, through this and future schemes.

1.2 Commencement date of the Scheme

This Scheme has been confirmed on **07 December 2015** by the Minister for Arts, Heritage and the Gaeltacht. It commences with effect from this date and shall remain in force for a period of 3 years or until a new scheme has been confirmed, whichever is the later.

Chapter 2: Overview of Louth and Meath Education and Training Board (LMETB)

2.1 Mission Statement

"Louth and Meath Education and Training Board is committed to excellence and innovation in the education of young people and adults through the provision of dynamic services delivered by professional staff"

2.2 Main Functions

LMETB is a statutory body with extensive responsibility for the delivery of education and training across Louth and Meath and manage 16 Post Primary schools, 1 Primary school and 2 PLC College.

LMETB also has a Further Education and Training Service offering flexible and inclusive educational programmes throughout the two counties including Adult Learning Services, Community Education, Back to Education Initiative, Adult Guidance Service, Vocational Training Opportunities Scheme and Night Classes.

LMETB has eight Youthreach centres.

Since July 1st 2014 Dundalk Regional Skills & Training Centre is under the governance of LMETB, having been transferred from SOLAS on that date.

LMETB is patron to 6 Community Schools.

Chapter 6: Improving Language Capability

6.1 Recruitment

The recruitment of staff with the appropriate level of competence in the Irish language in each area of work of Louth and Meath Education and Training Board (LMETB) will be the primary means of optimising the availability of services through Irish. Our recruitment policy, which is subject to the framework of agreed national recruitment procedures, will have regard to the need to improve Irish language capability on an incremental basis.

All new staff will be provided with an induction pack containing a copy of our agreed scheme in order to ensure that they are made aware of our commitments under the legislation.

6.2 Training and Development

Louth and Meath Education and Training Board (LMETB) is committed to making available opportunities for staff to attend appropriately accredited Irish language training courses, as resources permit. All staff will be advised of facilities/opportunities to improve their competency in Irish.

6.3 Designated Irish Language Posts

The posts listed below have been designated as having an Irish language competency requirement. It is the intention that holders of these posts will have achieved specified accredited standards in the Irish language, commensurate with the responsibilities of the post. When designating these posts, particular consideration has been given to posts located in Gaeltacht areas and to posts located outside Gaeltacht areas but whose customer base consists largely of Gaeltacht and/or Irish language speaking communities.

Chapter 7: Monitoring and Review
The implementation of the scheme will be monitored and reviewed on a regular basis by the Chief Executive of LMETB and the Senior Management Team. The contact person for the scheme will be; An Príomh Oide, Coláiste Pobail Ráth Chairn (faoi láthair - An tUasal Macdara O'Duillearga).
A formal system for monitoring requests for services through Irish will be available and recorded in our Annual Report.

Chapter 8: Publication of Agreed Scheme

This scheme will be published both internally and externally, through a press release initially. A bilingual version of the scheme will be made available on our website and circulated to all staff and appropriate agencies. Other means to publicise the scheme may also be used.

In addition, we will take every opportunity in our day to day interaction with customers to promote and publicise the services we provide in Irish through the following means:

- directly informing customers on a proactive basis of the option of conducting business with us through Irish, for example, by the display of notices at reception areas indicating the Irish language services that are available;
- prominently listing these services on our website;
- signifying on selected guidelines, leaflets and application forms that these documents are also available in Irish, unless presented bilingually;
- giving equal prominence to Irish and English language materials.

A copy of the agreed scheme will be forwarded to the Office of An Coimisinéir Teanga.

The English language version of this scheme is the official version.
